Plant Highlight - Japanese Summersweet – *Clethra barbinervis*

At the top of the Great Lawn, a little behind the sculpture ‘Observing Our Society’ you can find a lovely example of Japanese summersweet,, *Clethra barbinervis*. The name of the genus comes from the Greek ‘klethra’ which means ‘alder’ as the leaves of Japanese summersweet resemble those of the alder.

This small tree has four-season appeal. Its sharply serrated leaves are an attractive deep green colour. Its summer bloom consists of long horizontal or drooping racemes of lightly scented white flowers which attract bees and butterflies. In the fall, the foliage shows good colour ranging from yellow to red to burgundy on some specimens in the eastern US. Furthermore, the flower spikes give way to dark brown spikes of seed capsules. And in the winter, its bark is shown to best advantage; the cinnamon coloured outer bark peels off to show smooth patches of tan and grey.

The Arnold Arboretum of Harvard University has a striking specimen of *C. barbinervis* which is almost 130 years old. It stands over 20 feet tall and is nearly 15 feet wide.

E H Wilson, renowned plant hunter, collector for the Arnold Arboretum and eventually its Keeper, regarded *C. barbinervis* to be the finest ornamental plant in the genus. It has received the RHS Award of Garden Merit.

In our garden, look in beds 85A and 86 for examples of Japanese summersweet.

The eastern North American native species, *Clethra alnifolia*, or sweet pepperbush, is smaller and more of a shrub. There is lots of it in bed 177 in the Canadian Heritage Garden. Specimens of two pretty cultivars, ‘Pink Spire’ and ‘Ruby Spice’ can be seen in various places around the garden, including the Eastern North America Garden (107D), the Phyllis Bentall Garden (36B, 36C, 38C) and the Mediterranean Garden (33A). Check the Plant Collection Records for specific locations.
